It's a matter of choosing between delicious aromas coming from many outdoor cafes, for breakfast or just to hit caffeine. Walk around and you'll find yourself in Centre Place and Centre Way, which are full of strange and wacky specialty shops and teeming with cafes. When traveling through the lanes and arcades you should distract from the charm of storefronts to look up and check out the historic buildings in all its glory. It is often a line-up, so if your heart is set to experience high tea in all its glory, booking in front of us is a must. Shooting at Elizabeth Street and left onto Little Bourke Street, you'll find your way to Niagara Lane. It is home to several old warehouses (1880s) that make it fun exploring, with great refueling spots like Sun Moth Canteen and Bar. There are also plenty of great small lanes, nooks and crannies to wander from Bourke Street; Laurent Boulangerie's pastry shop is the perfect place for a sweet pit-stop. You can move through the Plaza and east along Little Collins Street, poking their heads in the aeches such as Dame Edna Place for a photo opportunity and take a look at some great street art. Then you'll find yourself in Howey Place, an avenue offering labels such as Alannah Hill, Oroton, FCUK and more. This is combined with the Capitol Arcade, home to the historic Capitol Theatre, a single-screen cinema that opened in 1924. Overlooking Swanston Street you'll spy on the impressive Melbourne Town Hall. Turning into Collins Street, you'll come across Manchester Lane and Flinders Lane, which offers fashion shops offering the latest trends, as well as many galleries and bars. It's the perfect place to finish your tour, with an afternoon drop at Young & Jackson's (which claims to be the most iconic hotel in Australia. If you're an art enthusiast, check out Chloe's Bar on the first floor. The famous portrait of Chloe has hung on the walls of the hotel since 1909. If you want to fix Street Art, find your way to Hosier Lane, Union Lane, Croft Alley and Caledonian Lane. Even if this isn't your first trip to Melbourne, it's worth jumping head-on into these acolyts to see ever-evolving works of art. This is something easy to do by yourself, but for real recognition of what goes into great work, check out the tour.
